Madama Butterfly Synopsis

The action takes place in Nagasaki, Japan, 1900

Act I.

B. F. Pinkerton, a lieutenant in the United States Navy, is going to marry Butterfly, a girl of 15, who was a geisha. He doesn't regard the marriage as legitimate and intends to marry a "real American girl" when he goes home. He is warned by Sharpless, the Consul, that Butterfly regards the marriage as serious and really loves him. After the marriage, Bonzo, Butterfly's uncle, denounces her as an outcast, because she dropped her religion and adopted Christianity and is marrying a foreigner. Butterfly and Pinkerton sing of their love.

Act II.

Butterfly begins by hoping that Pinkerton will return with his love. She pictures his ship in the harbor – she hasn't seen him for 3 years. Only her servant Suzuki sees the situation for what it is: Pinkerton will never come back. Sharpless arrives with a letter from Pinkerton, which is interrupted by a visit from the rich Prince Yamadori, who wants to marry Butterfly. Butterfly rejects him, saying that she is married to an American. Sharpless asks Butterfly – what if Pinkerton rejects Butterfly forever? Beside herself with grief, she brings in her child – saying that Pinkerton knew nothing of the child. Sharpless, heartbroken, leaves. Suddenly her servant Suzuki announces that Pinkerton's ship, the *Abraham Lincoln*, is in the Harbor. Butterly, filled with emotion says that the ground must be decorated with flowers.

Act III.

Pinkerton, together with his American wife, and Sharpless arrive early in the morning and ask Suzuki to tell Butterfly that they must take the child back to America. When Pinkerton learns that Butterfly is still in love with him, he doesn't know how he could have been so blind. He leaves. When Butterfly appears, only to learn that the woman in the garden is Pinkerton's wife and that Pinkerton is only there to take the child, she is stunned. Her only solution is to take her life with the Japanese sword. As she is dying, Pinkerton is heard in the distance crying, "Butterfly..." He perhaps realizes what he has done.

Ms. Cashour has given/prepared over 200 Arts Center classical recitals with singers and instrumentalists in the US and Europe and was critically acclaimed: "Tamara Cashour, the musical director, conducted a highly creditable musical performance". Ms. Cashour is also an active music director for regional music theatre productions (South Orange Performing Arts Center/George Street Playhouse, located in South Orange and Livingston, NJ, respectively) and in 2006 was in the top-ten finalists for the national position of Music Theatre Keyboardist at Washington, DC's Kennedy Center. Ms. Cashour is currently the Artistic Director of OperAvant.

Sharpless, the Consul

Is the Footlight Players founder (1984) and artistic director. and works in Suffolk County, and serves as Bass Soloist at The Church of The Ascension.

Concluded her second year as a Resident Artist with Dicapo Opera Theatre this past spring.
